

## Transcribed Data Part 2

**Due:** Friday, 4/7, on D2L by class time (9 AM)

**Grade:** 100 pts (3% of grade)

### Assignment

The purpose of this assignment is to select and transcribe a second set of data. In this transcription, you can choose to transcribe a) a second example of your communication practice from your audio/video recorded participant observation or b) parts of your audio/video recorded interviews or focus group that help expand on or explain about your communication practice.

The format of this assignment is similar to the first one:

In one paragraph, describe the data that you chose to transcribe. First, state what communication practice your data is an example of or, if you chose interviews, then what your transcription tells us about the communication practice you have chosen to study. Then, using Goffman, state how you identified the beginning and end of the segment you selected to transcribe. Afterward, provide some context – who is talking, where, during any particular event? This paragraph should be double spaced.

Then, provide your single spaced transcription of the data. You should transcribe NO MORE THAN 1 page. To transcribe, insert a table into Microsoft Word with 3 columns: column 1 for line numbers, column 2 to name the speaker, and column 3 for the transcription. It will look more or less like a script. Use the transcription conventions from either of the websites below to transcribe your data:

Ideally, this set of data will be used in the ‘analysis’ section of your full research paper, so choose wisely.

### Requirements

- 1-2 pages – double spaced intro paragraph and single spaced transcript, Times New Roman, 12 pt font, 1 inch margins
- **UPLOAD ACTUAL RECORDING OF DATA AS WELL**
- Paragraph is clearly written and cites Goffman.
- Transcription follows three column format and uses appropriate conventions from the websites
- Cite quotes or ideas from the reading with the author’s last name and year published
  - For example, Goffman (1981) states we can identify practices through....
  - **DO NOT INCLUDE TITLES OF READINGS**
